PROGRAM OBJECTIVE

The Miami Individual Artists (MIA) Grant Program provides non-matching awards to individual artists of all disciplines in Miami-Dade County on a competitive basis to support their artistic development and practice. In recognition of the contributions of Miami-Dade's outstanding artists to the fundamental vitality and creativity of our cultural community, the MIA Grant Program strongly encourages applications from professional artists of the highest caliber with a recognized body of original artwork, and who are deeply rooted in Miami's diverse cultural life.

ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible to apply, an artist **MUST**:

- ◆ Be a working professional artist (defined as a person who has created a recognized body of work over a sustained period and pursues this work as a means of livelihood). Professionals who work directly with individual artists - such as curators, arts administrators, producers, or presenters - are **not** eligible to apply;
- ◆ Be at least 18 years of age;
- ◆ Be a legal full-time resident of Miami-Dade County for at least one (1) year at the time of application;
- ◆ Have resided and worked in Miami-Dade County for at least one (1) year at the time of application; **and**
- ◆ Pursue the development of artistic activities and practice during the program funding period of **October 1, 2022 – September 30, 2023**. Activities may include, but not limited to, performances, presentations, exhibitions, workshops, research projects, development/creation of new work, etc.
- ◆ Be a working professional artist in one the following disciplines:
 - Dance (dancers, choreographers, dance artists, etc.)
 - Film/Video/Media Arts (filmmakers, computer/digital artists, etc.)
 - Folk/Traditional Arts (artisans, ceramicists, etc.)
 - Literary Arts (writers, poets, etc.)
 - Music (composers, musicians, singers, etc.)
 - Theater/Playwriting (playwrights, designers, actors, etc.)
 - Visual Arts (artists, photographers, etc.)
 - Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary

Students pursuing undergraduate or graduate degrees, non-professionals who engage in the arts as a hobby or employees and advisory board members of Miami-Dade County and their immediate families are **not** eligible.

Applications from artist collectives, duos or collaborative associations are **not** acceptable. Artists affiliated with collectives, duos or collaborative associations **are** eligible to apply; however, the artist endeavors and work samples presented in the application must reflect those of the

applicant. If the work was developed collaboratively, applicants will be asked to indicate their specific role in the work.

Recipients of an MIA Program award in the previous year **are** eligible to apply. If awarded, the previous year's final report must be submitted and deemed complete before the current year award can be processed.

DEADLINE

Application Deadline: Friday, March 17, 2023, at 11:59 PM

AWARDS

Awards of up to \$10,000 will be made to selected artists; limited to one (1) application per applicant. There is **no** matching fund requirement for this grant award.

Awards will be made out to the legal name and mailing address noted on the W-9 Form awardees must complete and return at the time of contracting. Selected artists will have the option to assign their award to their Limited Liability Corporation (LLC).

A MIA GRANT PROGRAM AWARD CARRIES NO COMMITMENT FOR FUTURE SUPPORT BEYOND THE FUNDED TIMELINE.

HOW TO APPLY

Applications are accepted online through Submittable at (it's free to register and use). [Click here to create a Submittable account](#) or enter <https://artinpublicplaces.submittable.com/signup>.

WHAT YOU NEED TO APPLY

- Proof of residency
- Artist Resume or Curriculum Vitae (CV)
(Applicants may submit a full-length bio in lieu of a resume or CV, if preferred)
- Artist Bio (up to 500 Words) – OPTIONAL
- Artist Statement (up to 200 Words)
- Description of artistic activities and practice being pursued during the grant period of October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023 (up to 500 Words)
- **Work Samples:** samples must have been completed within the last five (5) years prior to the application date. **Failure to comply with this condition will result in disqualification.**
 - **Literary Artists and Playwrights:** three (3) writing samples up to ten (10) pages each (examples include poems, excerpt of novel or script, short stories, etc.)
 - **Performing Artists:** three (3) video and/or audio samples up to 10 minutes combined

- **Media Artists:** three (3) video samples up to ten (10) minutes combined. Time-based media includes, but is not limited to, audio-based artwork, filmmaking, video-based artwork, etc.
- **Visual Artists:** up to ten (10) images (high resolution). Visual artists who work in sound, installations and kinetic sculpture may submit up to three (3) minutes of video, audio or dynamic media file in addition to still images to further describe their work.
- **Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary Artists:** up to ten (10) work samples. Samples may include images, videos, sound files, PDFs, and other mediums used in the artist's practice. Artists in this category may submit any combination of sample types; however, **video and/or sound examples are limited to no more than three (3) samples with a maximum running time of 10 minutes each.**
- Optional: up to three (3) additional support documents such as articles, catalogue essays, letters of support, photos, screenshots of social media posts, marketing materials such as postcards, etc.

SELECTION PROCESS AND EVALUATION CRITERIA

Submissions will be evaluated by a panel of experts assigned by discipline. To arrive at the finalists the panel will consider each applicant's level of professional involvement based on the body of work as evidenced by the submitted work samples and support materials. All samples submitted for review must have been completed within five consecutive years prior to the application date. Failure to comply with this condition will result in disqualification.

Submissions will be judged by the following criteria:

- Evidence of artist merit through an established and recognized body of work over a sustained period
- Consistency in the submitted body of work
- Quality and scope of the artistic activities and practice being pursued during the grant period (such as performances, presentations, exhibitions, workshops, research projects, and/or the development/creation of artwork)

APPROVAL PROCESS

The slate of selected artists and award recommendations will be submitted to the Miami-Dade County Cultural Affairs Council, the Department's volunteer advisory board, for approval. The Council's decision is considered final and may not be appealed.

Upon approval by the Council, the recommendations are forwarded to the Miami-Dade County Housing, Recreation, Culture and Community Development Committee. Upon committee approval, recommendations are forwarded to the Miami-Dade County Board of County Commissioners and Mayor for final approval.

Awardees will receive an award package which will include an agreement and other required documents and instructions for completion. These documents must be completed before the grant award recommendation can be processed. Payments will be issued no earlier than June 2023.

WORKSHOP

A workshop will be offered via Zoom to review the program's guidelines, application form and answer questions:

PUBLICITY AND CREDIT REQUIREMENTS

The Grantee must include the following credit line in all printed and electronic promotional and marketing materials related to this grant including websites, news and press releases, public service announcements, broadcast media, event programs, videos, and publications: **"With the support of the Miami-Dade County Department of Cultural Affairs and the Cultural Affairs Council, the Miami-Dade County Mayor and Board of County Commissioners."** For radio, television and/or online broadcast, we require the following voice-over language: **"This program is supported in part by the Miami-Dade County Department of Cultural Affairs."** For television and online broadcast, display of the County logo and the "www.miamidadearts.org" web address is required. The grantee must also use the County's logo in marketing and publicity materials, including but not limited to newsletters, press releases, brochures, fliers, websites, online content, or any other materials for dissemination to the media or public. The County logo is available at www.miamidadearts.org under Grantee Resources. Grantees are required to credit the County's support in any communications about the grant-funded project on social media platforms using @MiamiDadeArts and #MiamiDadeArts.

By accepting County funds, the grantee is required to recognize and acknowledge Miami-Dade County's grant support in a manner commensurate with all contributors and sponsors of its activities at comparable dollar levels.

COMPLIANCE AND LIABILITY

A Final Report is required within forty-five (45) days of the grant end date. All documents submitted to the Miami-Dade County Department of Cultural Affairs at any stage of the application cycle process, including electronic submissions, are subject to the State of Florida Public Records Law, Chapter 119, Florida statutes. (Section 119.011(12), Fla. Stat.). A MIA Program grant is to support artist activities that take place within the County's fiscal year for which it was awarded (October 1 - September 30). All funding recommendations are contingent upon approval of the Cultural Affairs Council, the Miami-Dade County Mayor and Board of County Commissioners and are subject to the availability of funds. Funding will be available for release during the County's fiscal year for which it was awarded (October 1 - September 30).

It is expressly understood and intended that the funded Artist is merely a recipient of a grant and is not an agent or employee of Miami-Dade County, its Mayor, its Board of County Commissioners, or the Miami-Dade County Department of Cultural Affairs. Funds not encumbered (contracted for) by the end of the County's fiscal year in which they were awarded, or for which a project extension has not been approved, shall revert to the Department of Cultural Affairs on September 30th of the same fiscal year.

All funded activities must provide equal access and equal opportunity in employment and services, and may not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, pregnancy, age, disability, marital status, familial status, sexual orientation, physical ability, gender identity or gender expression, or status as a victim of domestic violence, dating violence or stalking, in accordance with Title VI and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 as amended (42 U.S.C. 2000d et seq.), the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and Miami-Dade County ordinances No. 97-170, § 1, 2-25-97 and No. 98-17, § 1, 12-1-98.

Moss Cultural Arts Center, Joseph Caleb Auditorium and Miami-Dade County Auditorium, all dedicated to presenting and supporting excellence in the arts for the entire community. The Department receives funding through the Miami-Dade County Mayor and Board of County Commissioners, The Children's Trust, the National Endowment for the Arts, the State of Florida through the Florida Department of State, Division of Arts and Culture and the Florida Council on Arts and Culture, the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation, the Peacock Foundation, Inc. and The Jorge M. Pérez Family Foundation.
